The cost of maintaining the advanced life support service provided by GEMS is significant. We receive excellent service from GEMS and I know there is strong support for them in the community. Also happy 50th anniversary to GEMS.

I would like to again encourage anyone who might consider volunteering for any of the various boards we have at the town level; be it the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Appeals or the Board of Assessment Review that we are always looking for interested resident who wish to serve.

Greetings from the Highway Department

As I write this article, we are experiencing our first day of Fall, which is a warm one! We are definitely in the middle of an extended summer season as the leaves begin to change and our thoughts turn towards the inevitable onset of winter. Before totally giving over to the thought of winter maintenance I'd like to summarize what has been accomplished over the summer season.

The department has been busy over the summer months with the reconstruction of Crane Road from County Road 45 to the intersection of Parkis Mills Road; culminating with it being paved in July. A portion of Ridge Road was ditched and paved along with paving the catch basins. Ongoing maintenance included patching gravel and black top roads as well as cutting brush. Cross-culverts were replaced on Jersey Hill and Parkis Mills Roads and currently Dean Lung Road. We have also repaired washouts town-wide due to the heavy rains we have experienced over the summer. The department has assisted the surrounding towns of Ballston, Charlton, Greenfield, Halfmoon and Milton with their construction projects as well as Saratoga County. The department continued summer maintenance with mowing the ROW's, ballfields and the Town Hall.

With the seasonally warmer temperatures our construction season will continue with the paving of Ridge Road from County Road 14 (Crooked St.) to Lake Road, Faber Road and a section of Jersey Hill Road from the town line to Kania. We will continue our overhead brush cutting through the Fall in preparation for the upcoming winter. Once these projects have been finalized the department will switch over to preparing our equipment for winter road maintenance.

As always, there are wood chips and during the winter months, salted sand, available to Town residents. These items are located on the right-hand side of the driveway, before the main gate of the Highway Dept., as you pull into the Town Complex.

HISTORIAN

As recorded in the recently published book "Galway 1900 – 1949, A Photographic History", Galway was, during the first half of the 20th century, a primarily agricultural town consisting of many relatively small farms. Members of these farm families, because of a scarcity of personal transportation, pretty much stayed at home. Fortunately, some necessities of living were brought to their homes by vendors from nearby cities who, in panel trucks, stations wagons, and, of course, horse and buggy or wagon, traveled from farm to farm selling their goods.

There was the "baker" or "breadman" who offered white and rye bread and a variety of tasty baked goods. Those delicious pastries were always quite popular. There was the "meat man" or "butcher" who, with the help of ice, brought fresh meat, cut to order right on the spot, plus sausage, hot dogs, and some deli meats. Although most farmers raised their own vegetables, some items such as celery, head lettuce, oranges, pears, peaches were available from the "vegetable or produce man".

There was also a "rag man" who traveled around town collecting worn-out clothing for recycling. Another plus, which helped to prevent a buildup of obsolete or worn out farm machinery, was the "junk man" who purchased junk meatal from farmers then sold it to recycling centers.

Let's not forget the need for soaps, shampoos, salves, ointments, supplemental vitamins and other items which would be found in a pharmacy. These were provided by the "Rawliegh man" and the "Watkins" man. These congenial individuals braved barking and growling dogs to deliver their goods to the farm families. Also, back then, there were what was known as "General Stores" located throughout the town. Besides food, these stores sold shoes, boots, shirts, coats, hats, gloves, etc. You name it, they had it. A farmer generally did not have to travel far to get to one of these stores. We would like to salute these general stores, most of which allowed farmers to charge groceries then pay for them at the end of the month, when the "milk check came in".

Another good thing at the time when transportation was difficult was the mail order catalogs by Sears & Robuck and Montgomery Ward. They brought big department stores shopping as close as your mailbox. In fact, these catalogs offered items that would not be found in department stores. Montgomery Ward at one time sold a small farm tractor and some implements. Items too large to be shipped by mail had to be picked up at a rail station.

Grocery shopping, after large grocery stores came into existence, was made somewhat easier when "Price Chopper Stores" ran a bus service between Galway Village and their store in Amsterdam. Galway's housewives needed only to drive to the Village and back to get their grocery shopping done. Groceries were placed on the bus in Amsterdam, then, back in the village, transferred to the automobiles.

Fast forward past the popularity of shopping malls to this year of 2017 and observe shopping procedures. In place of the Montgomery Ward and Sears catalogs, people are using their computers, smart phones, tablets, etc. to purchase things and have them shopped to their doorstep or mailbox. Amazon and e-bay are today's Sears and Montgomery Ward. It appears that the mail order system is still trying to stay alive as droves of catalogs are being mailed out to homes regularly.

Galway Central School District

The Galway Central School District is off to a great start to the new school year. We are pleased to announce that our district is offering Project Lead the Way Computer Science all the way from kindergarten through grade 12. Starting with this year's kindergarteners, every student will have the opportunity to build knowledge and skills in an engineering and computer science pathway.

Our youngest learners will be taught in a dedicated Project Lead the Way classroom. Kindergarteners will learn through play with Animals and Algorithms. First graders will practice Animated Storytelling. Grade 2 will build skills with Grids and Games. Grade 3 will study Programming Patterns. Grade 4 will gain experience with Input/Output Computer Systems. Grade 5 will study Modeling and Simulation, along with Robotics.

Students in grades 6-8 will develop professional and presentation skills in Project Lead the Way Gateway. This sequence of courses will help students learn how hardware and software work together to create physical computing systems. They will also work in teams to create apps, develop computational skills, and get an overview of computer science.

High School students have the opportunity to take new classes such as Computer Science Principles, Computer Science Essentials, and Computer Science Applications. These programs tie in with our Curriculum for Agricultural Science, which has also expanded for the 2017-18 school year. Students are enjoying new courses including Small Animal Science, Large Animal Science, Wildlife and Resource Management, Floral Design, and Landscape Design.

"The school district received a \$54,000 gift from a Galway alumnus who wishes to remain anonymous," said Superintendent Shannon Shine. "This very generous donation helped us complete the K-12 Project Lead the Way continuum."

The \$54,000 gift provided teachers with the support they needed to develop and teach these new classes and to transform portions of both the High School and Joseph Henry Elementary School libraries into Makerspaces where students can design, build, and experiment with their own inventions.

The Galway Public Library

Galway Public Library had a busy and successful Summer Reading Program. The kids who turned in slips for prizes read a total of 1500 hours! Every child who participated was able to choose a free book, and many received prizes, thanks to all of our donors & sponsors: BSNB, Stewart's Shops, Art in Mind Studio, Creative Sparks, Friends of Galway Public Library, Saratoga County Youth Bureau, and the Ashman and Pandori families. We finished up the summer with our Community Ice Cream Social on August 25th. Thanks to Stewart's Shops for the ice cream and toppings, and to the Friends of the Library for scooping it. Music was provided by Rob Przedwiecki of *Happenstance*, and his wife.

Assemblywoman Mary Beth Walsh attended the Ice Cream Social to announce the \$13,000 bullet aid she secured for the library's New Building Fund. Library Board of Trustees President Arlene Rhodes spoke about the next steps toward the new building, which include approval of the architect's final plans and a fundraising goal of \$350,000. This amount will be added to the voter-approved bond money and the funds already pledged, for a total of \$2,567,000, the cost of the new building project. To raise the \$350,000, the library is actively seeking government grants and grants from private foundations, as well as community support. Groundbreaking for the new library is tentatively scheduled for mid-spring of 2018 with a grand opening in the summer of 2019.

Our ongoing programs for adults include tech classes on 2nd Saturdays each month, our Writers' Group, Open Art Sessions and book discussions. Our new Afternoon Tea at 3:30 on the 3rd Friday of each month gives adults a chance to relax and visit with others. A Mahjong group will be starting in October, with registration required, to be sure we have enough sets. All programs and classes welcome newcomers! Our kids' programs continue to meet throughout the school year. We have Artfull Mondays, Story Hour, a Teen Book Discussion, Tinker Tuesday, Cosmic Kids Yoga, Lego Club, Pokemon, Makerspace, Read to the Therapy Dog, a new Coding Club – and more!
