Over the past few years' participation has dwindled and so I would ask all who can please consider volunteering that day. The volunteers need only to fill the bags with litter and debris and the highway department will pick up the bags left alongside the road.

Keeping with the spring cleaning theme, the town will once again sponsor a bulk waste disposal drop off event this spring. The exact dates are being planned so keep watch on the town web site and local newspapers for exact dates. The initial plans call for a week in May and one in June where you will be able to bring bulk waste to the town highway garage for disposal. Again, details will be announced soon.

As I often do, I would once encourage you to consider volunteering some of your time to one of the many great community and civic organizations. There is nothing more valuable than your time and energies to continue to make Galway a great place to live. Just a few hours per month can make a world of difference.

GREETINGS FROM THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

As I write this article winter is coming to a close with spring beckoning around the corner. Our winter season was wrapping up when we experienced one of the largest storms in years on March 14th. Just when we thought spring would be warming things up for us we received another 20-24" snow. That is what living in the Northeast entails. With the advent of this snow we will not be switching over to spring maintenance quite yet. Having said that we did have the opportunity to begin clearing the sand from the roadways but this snow will now delay those efforts for a little while longer and will continue once the temperatures are warmer.

In reviewing our winter season, up until this last storm, our snowfall levels were normal with a considerable amount of freezing rain. Additionally, we experienced several storms that included extremely high winds causing power outages due to downed poles, trees and branches. The crews have been out there through it all cleaning up the trees and limbs. Given the high winds the crew did a considerable amount of clearing snow drifts throughout town as well.

In preparation for paving season we have begun cutting brush along Crane Road which is on the schedule for being rebuilt this year, as well as Dean Lung Road. Construction on these roads will begin as the weather permits. The crews have also been cutting brush along Spring Road.

We will soon be switching our attention from snow/storm maintenance to maintaining the ROW's. Our focus will be on clearing brush, downed trees and branches town-wide as well as sweeping up the winter sand. Please note that the weather has taken a toll on the roads with frost heaves even though the temperatures haven't been very cold. With spring fast approaching we will be posting the roads with the 4-ton weight limit signs. We ask that the public abide by these signs to help protect the investment in our road system.

As always, there are wood chips and during the winter months, salted sand, available to Town residents. These items are located on the right-hand side of the driveway, before the main gate of the Highway Dept., as you pull into the Town Complex.

The Galway Junior Rifle Club

The Junior Rifle Club is based out of the Galway Fish and Game Club on Rt. 29 and provides marksmanship and safety training to the young people of our community. Costs are kept as low as possible (\$25/year plus cost of ammo) so that as many kids as possible can participate. All juniors receive specific safety training before shooting, and new shooters are carefully supervised by the several certified instructors associated with the program.

Juniors start shooting prone, and advance through increasingly more difficult scoring requirements – winning prizes and awards as they go. They eventually work their way through the sitting, kneeling, and standings positions. The final qualification is "Distinguished Expert", and is extremely difficult. The whole sequence normally takes several years to complete.

Joey Hahn just completed his Distinguished Expert qualification, and two other boys are working through it at the present time. Several others are poised to start it soon.

Within the Junior Club, there is a smaller group that shoots competitively – they are very good and routinely rack up Division I college athletic scholarships. There won't be any this year because we don't have any seniors this year – however, four ex-Galway juniors are currently on college teams and are doing very well.

Bridget Edgerly (the team captain) has won almost every match we've shot in this year, and has been invited to Colorado Springs to shoot in the National Championships at the Olympic Training Center. Three of our ex-members will be there also. Note – this is one of the few sports where girls compete directly against boys, and generally do very well.

If you have a junior (at least 12 years old) who is interested in shooting, call Coach Boykin (882-9352) and get signed up. There are a limited amount of openings, and they go on a first come, first served basis. If you have questions, or would like to take a look at the club in action, call the Coach.

The next safety class where we can bring in new kids is in September, but if you're interested, don't wait to call.

BUILDING AND CODE ENFORCEMENT DEPARTMENT

2016 was another busy year construction-wise in the town of Galway. The Building Department issued a total of 106 permits ranging from small projects like sheds, decks/porches, swimming pools and general maintenance type items, to new garages, barns, additions/remodels, and new home construction. We issued 11 permits for new homes. Solar installations seem to gaining in popularity, having issued a total of 20 permits in 2016.

Now is the time to think about projects you may be planning. If you are unsure if your proposed project requires a permit, please CALL BEFORE YOUR START. At a minimum, permits are required for: Demolition, new construction, additions, residential improvements (decks, garages, kitchen expansion, etc), electrical system modifications (including stand-by generator installations), major plumbing work, solid wood fuel burning appliance installations (including pellet stoves).

Also, please keep in mind that your project may require a variance. This is particularly true in the Lake District where building lots tend to be small making it difficult to maintain the minimum setback requirement. Even if your structure exists and you are adding on, you may be required to obtain a variance if you are further encroaching on, or increasing the amount of encroachment, on a property line (i.e., adding to the length of a building would result in an increased encroachment). Once again, call and set up an appointment to discuss this while you are still in the planning phase. Variances can often take a couple months to process, adding time to the construction time table.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT OFFICE HOURS continue to be EVERY TUESDAY EVENING FROM 4:30 to 7:30 but we encourage you to call ahead for an appointment. Historian - The Centralization of Schools in Galway, NY

One of the many changes that took place over the years in the Town of Galway was in the town's school system. Our sources of information on this subject are "Sylvester's History of Saratoga County" 1878, John Chester Booth's "History of Saratoga County" 1858, W. Bronson Taylor's "Stories and Pictures of Galway" 1966, a summary written by Clayton H. Brown, District Superintendent of Schools, Galway area 1939-1966, and school records.

According to John Chester Booth, "Shortly after the return of the settlers, at the close of the war, (Revolutionary) the first school was opened, in a log cabin erected for that purpose at the Major settlement." Galway had private schools in the 1800's. On May 26, 1836 the Legislature incorporated the Galway Academy, which was located on West Street in Galway Village. This ended in 1863 and has a history of its own. There were private schools in several houses in Galway but no public high school until 1900. In 1900 Galway Village and contiguous territory were formed into District #3 Galway as a union free school with the power to establish a high school. On March 26, 1901 the voters approved the erection of a high school for the sum of \$4000. The size of this two-story building was doubled by an addition in themed 1920's. The first floor of this addition was a gymnasium with a stage at one end while the second floor was a large classroom. The gymnasium was used for gym classes in the winter months, assemblies, chorus practice, band practice, dances, concerts, gymnastics exhibitions, medical and hearing exams, and movie viewing. Gym class in winter was scaled down basketball practice, too small for home games so Perth High School gymnasium was rented for home games and full scale practice sessions. In the mid to latter 1940's a partition was installed in each of two classrooms in the original section, making four classrooms out of two. There was also a two story addition built in the latter 1940's on the east side of where the new section joined the old section. The principal's office was moved over into the second floor of this addition and his office was turned into a small classroom.

Stepping back in time, in 1815 the commissioner of schools divided the town into 12 districts. Over the years the number of districts changed as needed. In 1860 there were fifteen schools scattered throughout the towns of Galway and Providence. In the 1939-1940 school year the districts were; #1 Jersey Hill, #2 Jockey Street, #3 Union Free, #4 Moon District, #5 Birchton, #6 East Galway, #7 Parkis Mills, #8 Mosherville, #9 Greens Corners, #10 Radley Hill, #11 Bell, #12 Kimball plus Providence #1 Antioch, #2 Bark&ctr, and #5 Hagadorn. These districts elected clerks, trustees and collector-treasurers. Students completed grades one through eight at their rural school, then went grades nine through twelve and graduation at the high school in Galway Village. Traveling to the high school was either by foot or catching a ride with one of the few automobiles in town. During the early 1940's it was difficult to find teachers for these rural schools. The idea of centralizing these rural schools started back with Miss Lou Mesinger, who served as district superintendent for Galway from 1912 to 1931. Charles H. Field, who served as Principal during the period of 1931-1934, wrote his master's thesis on a proposal for the centralization of the Galway area. After the necessary formalities with the State Education Department, voting on a proposal to centralize took place on June 1, 1949. The results were yes-482, no-172 and the proposal was adopted along with a seven member board of education. With the closing of the outlying school districts during the 1930's and 1940's, space for the students became a problem. One June 12, 1950 and on March 8, 1951, two proposals and bond issues for a total of \$584,000 were approved for a new building plus an 18 acre site on Rte. 147. Until the completion of the new building in September, 1952, classes were held in 14 places. The old high school building was used until 1958 for grades K though 4. By the mid 1950's space again became a problem. An additional 93 acres of land was purchased by approval of the voters. A bond issue of %650,000 for a new 16 room elementary school addition was approved by the voters on September 26, 1956. This addition, upon completion, was named the "Joseph Henry Elementary School." By 1966, after a bond issue of \$1,120,000, the facility was made nearly twice its size to accommodate the growing number of students.

In retrospect, it seems the necessary progress of education in Galway took place quite timely. Dividing the town into districts served well at the time because it made a schoolhouse available within a reasonable distance of each family, a distance that a child, toddler through teens could handle. By the mid-forties, motorized transportation became more available, attendance in the rural schools declined, and by the end of the forties the time was right for centralization to take place.

What can you get for 65 cents a week?

A community asset, a place for life-long learning, children's activities, computer access, classes and programs and books and so much more, in a library that's adequate to meet the needs of our community. The Board of Trustees has been listening to the community and has approved a conceptual design for a new library building that's smaller and less costly than the previous version.

Here's what you want to know: the building size is 5930 square feet; architects' total project cost is estimated at \$2,567,000; amount of the bonded indebtedness of \$1,150,000 would have an impact of an additional \$34 a year (65 cents/week) for a taxpayer owning a \$200,000 full-market-value property. *This amount includes the extra operating costs in a new building.* A referendum is in the process of being scheduled for mid-June.

The library's Board of Trustees wants to ensure that everyone receives accurate information about this plan and referendum, so they are holding information sessions with local organizations and planning a community-wide mailing before the vote.
