Town Historian

We were pleased to learn that a Town of Galway farm has been included in a State Land Preservation Program whereby conservation easements are bought to prevent it from ever being developed, while the owners can continue to use it for agricultural purposes. This farm, since 1938 is locally known as the Lendl Farm and is situated along Parkis Mills Road; south of Mosherville. The Town of Galway map shows the farm belonging to E. Savage and was still E. Savage on the 1866 map. Sometime between 1856 and 1866, Parks Mills Road was rerouted where it passed through this farm. The bridge that crossed the Gloweegee Creek was located a distance downstream of its current location. It was near where the girl scout camp branch merges with the Mosherville branch of the creek. The new route also skirted a steep incline and a 90 degree left turn near the farmhouse. The farm was purchased in 1938 from Paul Cevan by William F. and Anna Lendl. Paul Cevan, we believe, moved to a farm shown on the 1866 map as belonging to J. Pettit.

William F. (Willie) Lendl was born in Vienna, Austria and raised in Budapest, Hungary. He graduated from Majarovar University with a degree in agronomy. He also studied art and oil painting. Willie came to America in 1930 and stayed a short while with his brother, Charles, who had come to America in 1926 and was working as an engineer in Connecticut. A newspaper help wanted ad for farm work brought Willie to Gansevoort in Upstate New York. He worked very hard on a farm for a year before relocating to New York City. There he earned a living at house painting and wall papering for around the next eight years. He joined a class to learn the English language, where he met and later married Anna Marie Stickrad, who was also studying the English Language. They raised a son, Milton, born 1934 and a daughter, Millie, born 1938. Always wanting a farm in Upstate New York, Willie and his wife, Anna bought the 65-acre farm on Parkis Mills Road in the Town of Galway, as was previously stated. Starting out, it didn't take long to discover that their soil was drastically depleted of the necessary nutrients. So Willie got to use the knowledge that he gained from his major course of studies back in college, and use them he did.

During the thirty years of running the dairy farm, Willie and Anna encountered trials as well as tribulations. In the late forties, their big, old barn burned to the ground. Badly needing a building to shelter and milk his cows, Willie took his axe and saw, cut some poles from his woods and hedgerows and with these poles he built a temporary barn using the tin sheets from the burned barn for roofing. While continuing to milk, feed and care for his cows, Willie drew up plans for and with time and the help of neighbors, built a poured concrete walled barn with cow stanchions at grade level and hay storage overhead under a quanset type of roof (years later, the quanset style was replaced with a gambrel style as it currently exists). Sometime in the early sixties, all farmers in the area were given a choice; purchase bulk milk tank (a very costly item), build a new milk house with given specifications or quit dairy farming. Willie and Anna took the first option and purchased a bulk milk tank and brought their milk house up to specifications. They were not yet ready to quit dairy farming. Harsh, cold and deep snow winters added to the trials category.

In the spring of 1968, Willie was forced to retire from farming because of his gall bladder surgery. After his retirement, his opened an art studio behind his garage where he held art classes and completed many paintings. He specialized in landscapes and portraits, which he sold locally and in many other states and foreign countries. Willie and Anna were members of the Galway Seniors, Willie belonged to a local storytelling group, and did some writing and hosted coffee klatches. Hay continued to be harvested, fields reseeded, limed and kept clear by Milton and Millie, who for years supplied local horse owners with hay, before the farm was released to Eildon Tweed Farm in West Charlton, the largest dairy operation in Saratoga County.
