Post Holiday Greetings,

I hope you and yours had an enjoyable holiday season and had an opportunity to spend quality time with family and friends. I would like to wish everyone a very happy 2018. It is my hope for everyone to have a healthy and successful 2018.

At the town level, there many things happening. By mid-winter, we hope to have a new plow truck on the road. Our Highway Superintendent Dave Costanzo was able to obtain a late model, low mileage Freightliner truck through the Federal Surplus Property Program and the truck is being outfitted with a plow, wing and dump box for sanding. The cost for this will be less than \$125,000. By comparison a new truck set up for winter plowing costs \$225,000. We are just now cycling through trucks at the town level that are 18-19 years old.

Also, another big project being seriously considered by the Town Board is a town wide property revaluation. It has been over 25 years since the last comprehensive revaluation and assessment roll update in the Town. Inside the Galway Reader, you will find an article outlining the rationale for considering such a project. There is more to follow on this.

Our recent bulk waste drop off conducted in October and early November was a big success. Many residents took advantage of disposing of unwanted and unneeded material. Based on the success of this program we will in all likelihood have two more in 2018 in late spring and fall.

Just a couple of reminders: if you heat with wood, please be sure your chimney and stove are in good condition. Safety first! Also please consider making a donation to the Galway food pantry. This is a great community resource for those who need it.

Historian

It is common knowledge that the early settlers who came to this area in 1774 were from Galloway, Scotland. We wonder, has anyone ever given much if any thought to what inspired these people to leave the land of their birth to embark on this long and dangerous journey, not knowing what they will find in this new land across the Atlantic Ocean. What ships were available in 1774? How many days would they need to live on a ship to reach the new land? Would there be enough food available to sustain them? Who do they deal with over there if they do survive the voyage?

A Bing search online for "Transatlantic Ships of 1774" brings up some images of the ships of that era. The website states "Crossing the Atlantic in the colonial period was a gruesome, life-threatening endeavor for all travelers, regardless of wealth or seamanship. Migration across the Atlantic often involved a series of steps, drawing people to London before they embark on their Journey. "Included are excerpts from the journal of a man named John Harrower, a 40-year-old Scotch shopkeeper and tradesman who lived in the far north of the British Isles, like many of the 40,000 residents of the Scottish Highlands who left after 1760. These people faced poverty and little opportunity, starving for want of employment. John Harrower left London for Virginia in early 1774 with very little money in his pocket. He signed up to serve as a schoolteacher in Virginia. He wrote in his journal on Tuesday, 24 May, 1774; "I left the ship at 6:00 a.m. having been sixteen weeks and six days on board her." According to John Chester Booth's History Saratoga County, 1858, "In 1774 John and James Major, with thirteen families from Galloway in Scotland, made a settlement in the neighborhood of what is now known as Galway". If there were children amongst these families, the parents might have heard "Are we there yet?"

It would be interesting to find out where their ship landed and let them off. Possibly in New York, after which they could have traveled up the Hudson River then possibly over to Schenectady. They must have dealt with Daniel Campbell as they settled in a part of the Patent of the Kayaderosseras. Whether or not these families were aware of the impending revolution before they left Scotland is unknown to us. We do know that they remained neutral until the autumn of 1780, when they were raided and driven from their land and homes by Joseph Brandt and his Indian followers. As we know, it wasn't until 1783 that our settlers, at least of few of them, returned to their "New Galloway".

Town wide Real Property Revaluation

On behalf of Town Board and myself, we wanted to let the property owners of the Town of Galway know that the Town is in the beginning stages of planning for a town wide property revaluation for the purposes of updating our assessment rolls. It has been over 25 years since the last comprehensive town wide revaluation. It is very important for the town to keep its assessment roll as up to date and accurate.

Currently, the Town's equalization rate is at 56% which means on average property assessment values are 44% below full market value. Galway currently has the third lowest equalization rate in the County. Only the Towns of Edinburg and Waterford are lower. The Town of Waterford currently has a revaluation project underway. It is important for the town to work toward obtaining 100% equalization for accuracy, fairness and long term assessment stability which will benefit the town.

Many residents of the Town do not realize that the portion of County sales tax dollars we receive is based on a formula that utilizes both population and property assessed value. The population of the Town has remained relatively the same and the value of the property assessments has been slowly drifting downwards while other towns have obtained a 100% equalization rate. To illustrate how important, it is that we protect the amount of sales tax we receive, residents should know that sales tax receipts from the county make up just over 47% of the total revenue received by the town. Decreases in our sales tax revenue would require higher property taxes or dramatic cuts in services at the town level.

It is important to understand, simply by undertaking a property reassessment does not mean your property taxes will automatically go up.

If the full market value of your property is correct, you should see little effect on your taxes from the revaluation project. Other possible effects of a revaluation project might be for those whose full market values are either too high or too low, too high will result in some potential reduction in your taxes, or if your full market value is too low, you may see an increase in your taxes

Your tax rate per \$1,000 of assessment is based on the amount of money the Town needs to raise to cover the cost of services and other expenses. This is called the tax levy. The tax levy is what determines your tax rate not the amount of your assessment. The State of New York has imposed a tax cap on municipalities. The tax cap guards against rapid and unchecked increases in the tax levy.

The Town Board is planning an informational session to discuss the method, timing and other aspects of the revaluation. More will be forth coming regarding the date and time.

The Galway Jr. Rifle Club

The Junior Rifle Club is open to all the kids in the area. Its primary purpose is to teach marksmanship and safety to the young people in our community. The club is sponsored by the Galway Fish and Game Club with help from the Galway Youth Commission and The Lions Club. The juniors shoot every Wednesday evening from September until May. There are several certified instructors associated with the program, so each junior gets a lot of individual attention. All new shooters are required to take a safety class and pass a written exam before they actually start shooting. Safety classes are scheduled for September and January.

Juniors are awarded prizes every time they reach new skill levels. They soon become accomplished marksmen. Every year there is a match of the juniors against their parents – the juniors have never lost.

Within the club, there is a smaller group that shoots competitively. They do very well, winning numerous state championships, regional championships, and even a couple of national championships. Along the way, they've accumulated seven Division I college scholarships.



As we look forward to celebrating the holidays with family and friends, listening to the incredible music performed by our student musicians under the direction of our talented faculty and staff, we also congratulate the following students:
